The word of God

A reading from the book of Revelation.

I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of mighty thunder-peals, crying out, 'Hallelujah! For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns. Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his bride has made herself ready; to her it has been granted to be clothed with fine linen, bright and pure' – for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints. And the angel said to me, 'Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb.' And he said to me, 'These are true words of God.' Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said to me, 'You must not do that! I am a fellow-servant with you and your comrades who hold the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy.'

Glory to you, O Lord

There was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord; Praise to you O Christ (John 2:1–11)

Last week we heard about Jesus' encounter with Nathanael. Nathanael recognises Jesus as someone special and declares: 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!' Immediately after calling his first disciples, and his meeting with Nathanael, Jesus visits Cana for a wedding

feast. Cana was Nathaniel's native village. As Jean Varnier observes, another religious leader might have led new followers into the desert for a spiritual experience, or to a school to deepen their knowledge of scripture. Jesus, however, takes them to a week of feasting in an obscure Galilean village. There he reveals himself, and the nature of his mission. The miracle at Cana is the first in a series of 'signs' in John's gospel. They point to Jesus' passion and the nature of Jesus as Son of God.

This first miracle of Jesus has caused commentators a number of headaches. Jesus performs an astounding miracle but he does not heal anyone of a dreadful illness or rescue those who are threatened by a storm. Rather, he provides a vast quantity of wine for a wedding feast and spares the blushes of a young couple. A wedding feast in first century Palestine would have been a lavish affair which involved the whole community. The feasting at Cana would have lasted about a week. Such celebrations were times of great revelry: the Aramaic word for 'wedding feast' has the same roots as the word for 'drink'. Many residents of Galilee were involved in the production of wine, but most could only afford to drink it on special occasions. A wedding is always an expensive commitment. In Cana, the bridegroom and his family would have saved for a long time to put on such a feast. Running out of wine at your wedding was one of the most powerful ways in which poverty became a cause of shame.

Cana was a small village near Capernaum. The whole village would have been invited to the wedding feast including Jesus the local celebrity along with his mother and the disciples. The couple and their family would have wanted the occasion to be perfect. What a disaster to run out of wine! It looked as if the wedding would be remembered not for the famous guests nor for the wonderful party, but for the negligence of the host who had seriously under catered.

Mary, presumably aware of these dynamics, implores her son to act before the wine runs out. Jesus is brusque- even rude- to his mother. 'Woman what concern is that to you and me? My hour has not yet come.' (John 2:4) Angus Ritchie remarks: 'This signifies a move from the obedience that Jesus showed his family while he lived in Nazareth to a public ministry based entirely on obedience to his heavenly Father.' His mother is not fazed by Jesus' remark and asks the servants to do whatever he tells them.

Jesus uses the water held in stone jars meant for the Jewish purification rituals. Each jar would have held about 100 litres of water- that's over 200 pints. So with 6 jars that meant 600 litres or more than 1200 pints of wine. Some commentators have problems with this amount of wine. Tasker

suggests it was just the water drawn off by the servants which became wine; the rest stayed as water. Others interpret the story purely symbolically. But if we take the story at face value, we see that Jesus doesn't just create the wine out of nothing. He transforms the ordinary into something extraordinary.

This particular miracle, John tells us, was performed in the run up to the Passover festival. 'The Passover of the Jews was near and Jesus went up to Jerusalem [for the festival]' (John 2:13) The water at Cana is in jars for ritual purification. Their transformation points us to the new wine of the Kingdom: the blood which will be poured out when Jesus' hour finally comes. The final Passover which Jesus shared with his disciples was the Last Supper, during which the cup of wine was shared. 'Then he took a cup and after giving thanks he gave it to them saying, 'Drink from it all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant which is poured out for the forgiveness of sins.' (Matthew 26:27-28) While its immediate effect is to rescue his host from shame, the miracle at Cana heralds a far greater work of transformation.

The miracle of the wedding at Cana outlines the unimaginable generosity of Jesus. It is a generosity demonstrated throughout his earthly ministry and beyond in the gifts which Jesus gives to his followers. Besides being the third Sunday of Epiphany, today also falls in the Week of prayer for Christian Unity. It is during this week that we celebrate the things which unite us as Christians and pray for one another in our worship and our witness. The generosity which Jesus showed at the wedding feast is a challenge to us to show generosity to others. As Pope John XXIII said, 'Whenever I see a wall between Christians, I try to pull out a brick.'

The servants at the wedding feast may have been mystified by Jesus' instructions but they did what he asked them to do. They filled the stone jars with water, which would have required a lot of effort on their part. They drew some liquid off and took it to the man in charge of the feast to taste. And the wine was wonderful!

Let us pray that God will renew and refresh us, despite the many challenges which we face. I will end with a prayer by Bishop Theodore Woods.

Into your hands, O Lord, we commend ourselves and all who are dear to us. Be with us in our going out and in our coming in; strengthen us for the work you have prepared for us to do; and grant that we may be so filled

with your Holy Spirit that we may joyfully achieve all you want us to do; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
